General Assembly on Synodality 2023.



Pope Francis appointed over 450 participants for the general assembly of the Synod of Bishops on Synodality in October 2023, including clergy, religious sisters, and laypeople from around the world.

The purpose of the Synod is not to produce more documents but to inspire people to dream of the Church we are called to be, to make the hopes of people flourish, to stimulate trust, to heal wounds, to weave new and deeper relationships, to learn from each other, to build bridges, to enlighten minds, warm hearts, and empower our hands for the shared mission.



Synod of Bishops unveiled: What you need to know.

A significant assembly where the future of the Cath-

olic Church is being discussed. Imagine it as the Super Bowl of our faith, bringing together bishops from around the globe to deliberate on crucial issues.

> Pope Francis, a beacon of progressive leadership, has set the tone for this Synod, touching upon hot-button topics like the possibility of priests marrying, communion for divorced and remarried Catholics, the potential for women to become deacons. and addressing matters pertaining to the LGBTQ community. These are topics that resonate deeply with our faith, and this Synod is poised to offer thoughtful reflections on these important questions.

Unlike previous synods that focused on singular issues, this one takes a holistic approach—delving into how the Catholic Church can become more inclusive. The winds of change are evident in the voting structure, with lay people now having a voice in the decision-making process for the first time.

Now, let's delve into the origin of the word "Synod" It stems from the Greek words "Syn," meaning together, and "hodos," meaning road or way. Essentially, A "synod" is a gathering or assem-bly of ecclesiastical leaders to discuss and make decisions on matters of doctrine, discipline, or pastoral issues within a specific religious community. While the recorded history of such meetings dates back to the mid-second century, modern synod assemblies, occurring once every three or four years, have become a crucial forum for church leaders.

Traditionally, only bishops held the power to vote at these gatherings. However, at this Synod in Rome, we witness a groundbreaking shift, with 54 out of the 365 voting delegates being women—a historic moment for inclusivity.

Pope Francis, recognizing the need for change, has revamped the Synod of Bishops structure over the past decade. His vision is clear: to foster open debate, honest discernment, and a synodal culture within the Church. This Synod is not just about discussing issues; it's about shaping the future of our Church with the input of a diverse, inclusive community.

Let's keep our eyes on this transformative moment in the Catholic Church.

DOES STRESS AFFECT BLOOD SUGAR?

STRESS & BLOOD SUGAR.

Stress is a powerful thing, and while we usually think of it as affecting our moods, it can also have profound effects on our bodies, including our ability to regulate blood sugar.

When you are stressed, the "stress response" is usually also have g our ability can significantly affect our bodies, including our in-

blood sugar regulation.



As stress hormones are released, our insulin levels drop, which can cause a rise in blood sugar. This can be particularly serious for someone who has diabetes or pre-diabetes.

Let's take a look at the relationship between stress and blood sugar: how stress causes blood sugar fluctuations, possible complications, and how you can manage both stress and blood sugar levels.

The Connection Between Stress and Blood Sugar.

Most of us associate spikes in blood sugar with dietary choices, such as eating too much sugar or too many carbs. But many elements can affect how our bodies regulate blood sugar, including dehydration, heat and sun exposure, and skipping meals. Stress, including life circumstances, illness, and lack of



sleep, is also a contributing factor when it comes to

flammatory response, immune system, and metabolism.

High levels of stress can:

- Elevate cortisol levels, with impacts how our bodies metabolize sugar
- Elevate our glucose (blood sugar) levels
- Inhibit the release of insulin, which regulates blood sugar
- Change our body's sensitivity to insulin release
- Make our body more resistant to insulin

Additionally, when you are experiencing increased levels of stress, you are more likely to eat poorly, skip meals, and sleep badly, all of which can also contribute to unregulated blood sugar issues.
