After reflecting on Gerry Pierse's presentation, let us now prepare our minds and hearts to listen to what the Scripture has to say to us in answer to the above question. According to the Gospel of Mark the Evangelist; when Jesus and his disciple came to Capernaum, and after going indoor Jesus asked his disciples, "What you were arguing about on the road?" (Mk 9:33). There was a great silence, no one dares to say anything or even to answer him, because among themselves they knew what they were arguing about. Jesus sat down and called the twelve disciples, and said to them, "Whoever wants to be first must place himself last of all and be the servant of all." (Mk 9:35). To make them understand what he was saying to them, Jesus uses a very simple and humble image of a child. He took a child, stood him by his side and said to them, "Whoever welcomes this child in my name, welcomes me; and whoever welcomes me, also welcomes the one who sent me. For the one who is least among you all is the greatest." (Lk. 9:48).

Brothers and Sisters, reflecting on the two perspectives presented above in answering the ques-

tion. Who is the Greatest among You? I believe that it helps you to see the difference between the worldly perspective and the spiritual perspective. Under the worldly perspective, Gerry Pierse highlights three (3) important points where many times as Christian we often fall into. a) Possessions, b) prestige, and c) power.

a) Possessions: Brothers and Sisters, many times as Christians, we are tempted to own many things, thinking that by accumulating properties, people around us will see us as the greatest. Nothing is wrong with owning many properties, but we should also have the attitude of giving and sharing with others. Jesus, in his ministry, challenges the Pharisees and those who are listening to him; share and give to those in need, and you will receive in return more gifts, even overflowing. As Christians, we should balance our lives by owning what is enough for us, and sharing with others what we have. By doing this, the result will not only be great on Earth, but you will have a great reward in the Kingdom of Heaven.

b) PRESTIGE:

Brothers and Sisters, after reflecting on the world of possessions, we have come to the point of realization and seen that we have fallen in love with material things of this world. We have trapped ourselves in the world of materialism, and we cannot escape. As mentioned in point "a", the only remedy for us to be released was to balance our life; owning what is enough for me and sharing with others what I have.

Now, as we come to our second point of reflection on prestige, we, too, many times we have been tempted and fallen from our status or position. People no longer have respect for us, because we thought that achievement and success are not for others but only for me. As Christians, we should let go of or detach ourselves from this selfish attitude and see that others, too, can reach achievements and success

C) POWER: Reading newspapers, National or International, watching TV, listening to the radio, and other means of communication; Internet, Facebook, etc, you could see that everywhere in different parts

of the world people are fighting for power.

MV ST. PETER SINKING

An article from the Solomon Star News dated 22 August under the heading "MV St. Peter Sinks at Logha Wharf" has mentioned that the cargo vessel owned by the Catholic Church of Gizo, that the vessel sank at Logha Wharf on Monday morning.

However, the initial paragraph of the article contains two inaccuracies regarding the description of the vessel and the date of the sinking.

In the subsequent paragraph, the article presents another falsehood, claiming that the ship had suffered from mechanical issues for a decade. Moreover, the author asserts that he interviewed a witness regarding the circumstances of the sinking.

Additionally, he enhances his article by emphasizing several key points:

- 1. The negligence exhibited by the crew and the caretaker.
- 2. The reasons behind the sinking are attributed to collective failure.
- 3. The environmental concerns associated with the incident.

The vessel, known as Kamila, was acquired from PNG and is registered under the name St. Peter in the Solomon Islands. It does not prioritize cargo or passengers, as its intended purpose is to support pastoral programs.

A wooden ship was previously coated with fibro in Gizo by our overseas friends and local workers, and it has been operating between Choiseul and Western Province for an extended period.

The vessel is now in need of maintenance. Upon inspection, it was determined that several areas require attention. However, since the church has purchased another ship, MV Galilee, the St. Peter has been left unattended and is scheduled to be preserved as a historical vessel. The engine, which remains in good condition, has also been removed.

Social media is a way for the Church to be among the people, and work toward the common good, not about compromising the truth to gain followers or 'likes.'



'Towards Full Presence'

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The Document's aim is to promote a common reflection on the involvement of Christians in social media, which have increasingly become part of people's lives. Inspired by the parable of the Good Samaritan, the document offers an opportunity to begin a shared reflection on how to promote a culture of being "loving neighbours" in the digital world as well.

Asked about the need for such a document and its significance, Ruffini recalled that, from the very beginning of the Dicastery, they perceived the need of making a reflection and then a document on this topic, especially as technology was rapidly changing.

What was sought, he said, was a reflection "starting from the Gospel," from "a theological and pastoral perspective on how to deal with technology that is changing."

No to compromising truth

The social media in which we should be present, he noted, should not "nourish hate speech, fake

news, deepfakes," but "nourish the truth, the love and compassion."

"The most important thing," he said, "is to be aware of this and to be aware that we can also say that in the history of humanity, always there is evil. And for us believers, there is the devil that is working always in the way that the history develops."

He noted that technology is not something that "should invent us"; instead, we must "negotiate the rules and the algorithms" to "share and work toward the common good," which he lamented, "we too often forget."

"We know that maybe a fake news [will] have more followers than the truth, but is this the way we will develop the better world? I don't think so. In any sense, I don't think so."

Ongoing Discernment

Vatican News also interviewed Sister Nathalie Becquart who discussed the proper approach to social platforms.

"It's an ongoing discernment, and that's why I really want to highlight that this document is coming from a synodal approach involving many people because nobody alone has the magic solution to have a good presence on social media and then the context is different. And so that's why it's very important that this document helps people to do their own discernment, especially with others as Christians in their own community, to find and to discern the way and ongoing discernment."

She also acknowledged the risks inherent in social media. "In the digital culture, you have the best and you have the worst. So that's why it's very, very important to educate people, to train them to do this.

Many in the Church, she reiterated, have asked for guidance on this theme. She recalled that the during the Synod on Young People in 2019, the youth asked for advice on how to move properly in the digital realm, in a fruitful, and faithful way. How to be present on social media, despite its difficulties, she expressed, is a widely-desired reflection. "This is the reality of the Church today, and the People of God," she said.

Sr. Becquart highlighted how, in this atmosphere, sensibility, awareness and good judgment are required. That view, unfortunately, is not shared by everyone, and therefore, we need to continue exercising a healthy scepticism.

Embracing the 'language' of the times

Msgr. Lucio Ruiz, the Secretary of the Dicastery for Communication, offered a reflection on the work, and highlighted how we can learn from missionaries, who, before their tremendous work, learned 'the language' to communicate and contribute to the new evangelization.

Pope Francis, he said, makes ever greater contributions to the reflections of his predecessors, to adjust to the current moment, in a way that is most appropriate and impactful for the times, embracing the instruments, accordingly, in their proper measure.

This task, he noted, belongs to us, as a 'Church that goes out,' to reach everyone, to the existential peripheries. "We need to go, we need to go out," he insisted.

Msgr. Ruiz suggested that social platforms are important, and are about "enriching" what "is real." "The Church needs to go down to the 'field,' something which Jesus told us to do, noting it is impossible to not be present. It is the culture, nowadays, and where there is man, there, the Church needs to be present."

A comfort to the disabled

Sr. Veronica Donatello, S.F.A., head of the National Service for the Pastoral Care of Persons with Disabilities of the Italian Episcopal Conference (CEI) and a consultor of the Holy See Dicastery for Communication, often recognized for providing the signlanguage service during the papal events, as she did during the pandemic, addressed the press conference.


She highlighted, in particular, how social media can be an important tool for disabled people, noting how it often enables them to feel a greater sense of "existing" or of "being present."

However, Sister Donatello warned that despite the great value of these technological resources, they will never be able to replace what is real, such as being present or offering an embrace.

The ship was left in its location because there was interest from a potential buyer. This is the reason for its abandonment.

It is important to note that the vessel did not sink on Monday, but rather on Saturday, after all our crew members had been out the day prior. The crew was engaged with another vessel, MV Galilee, while others were busy securing seaplane (Bishop's Sea Plane) parts in a container for transport to Noro.

The sinking of the vessel was attributed to heavy rainfall on Thursday night, which led to water accumulation. This issue was communicated to the workers who are engaged to Nusatube airstrip on Friday.

On Saturday night, the vessel sank between 4 am and 5 am. The suspected cause was a leak in the fibro coating of the vessel, which allowed water to enter without alerting anyone.

Due to the removal of the Engine from the vessel, there is currently no oil discharge in Gizo harbor that poses a concern to the public.

When should I see the doctor?

of a kidney infection, as you will usually need treatment with antibiotics.

If you are very unwell, you may need to be treated tal for intravenous (IV) antibiotics.

When should I seek urgent care?

You should seek care urgently from your doctor or local emergency department if you have symptoms of widespread infection, for example:

- high fever (over 38.5°C) a fast pulse rate (over 120 beat per minute)
- difficulty breathing
- confusion
- severe drowsiness

You should also seek urgent care if you have a low-

ered immune system or you have a history of kidnev problems.

How is a kidney infection diagnosed?

Your doctor will ask about your symptoms and examine you. If they suspect a kidney infection, they may refer you for tests:

A urine test can help clarify whether there is an infection in your urinary tract.

An ultrasound or CT scan can check for a blockage in your urinary tract.

Blood tests can check for infection in your blood.

How is a kidney infection treated?

If you have a kidney infection, you might need to start treatment in hospital with intravenous (IV) You should see your doctor if you have symptoms antibiotics directly into a vein. When your symptoms have improved enough, you may be able to take your antibiotics orally (by mouth) at home.

What are the complications of a kidney infection?

Kidney infections can lead to various complications including:

- septic shock
- kidney failure
- multiorgan failure

To prevent these complications, it is important to treat kidney infections promptly.
