



BISHOPS' PASTORAL MESSAGE — July 2023.



Dear Collaborators, friends, people of God of the Gizo Diocese,

The last week of June was a truly blessed one for our diocese. Bishop Elect Peter accompanied our priests in their journey of their annual spiritual retreat. From the

comments I heard it was a truly spiritual experience of Communion of the Gizo Priests with God, with their new bishop and with each other.

Rainy weather and Betania rest house provided an ideal atmosphere. Rough seas delayed a bit their return trip.

We welcome to Fr Charles of the Servants of Charity to be with Fr Anil at Noro. We empathize with Fr. Simon affected by Dengue and wish him quick recovery.

On Sunday July 2 we celebrated the solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul the patrons of our Diocese. The first ordination of a permanent deacon (Rev Jerome Kuibatu) in the history of the Solomon Catholic Church and the following well prepared program crowned the activities of the day. A true experience of Communion with God,

our protector saints and each other.

I took the occasion to meet all the priests at the end of their retreat and the organizing committee to exchange views about the 'taking possession of Bishop Elect Peter'. We then presented the proposed date to the Nuncio, the Archbishop and Bp. Peter. We now have a date.

<u>We chose August 27</u> for the taking possession of the diocese by our new Bishop.

The Preparatory committee headed by our Vicar Fr Te'e is preparing for the details of the celebration. I am sure they will inform us soon of the details of the events and of the solidarity needed from every one.

We are inviting every parish to participate in the spiritual preparation with prayer vigils and some appropriate activities for the 9 days previous to the Celebration. The purpose of the prayer vigils will be to ask God for all the graces our new bishop will need to lead the priests and the people of God as a Good Shepherd.

I also ask your prayers that I may discern God's will for me now. One thing is sure, as long as we are still alive our mission is not ended... I still feel very much alive (as a 76 years old) and may I ask you to join me in thanking God and renewing my YES to His will and His Kingdom as the highest priority in my life, "till my last breath" "until death do us part"



After completing two months of pastoral work in St Peter's Parish Gizo, Fr. Charles Taloikwai from the Diocese of Auki was finally farewell.

His farewell ceremony was on the 14th of

June at 7pm with the presence of Vicar General Fr. Stephen Te'e, religious, and parishioners.

During the speeches the vicar thanked him for his enthusiasm and dedication. He was described as a prayerful,

disciplined, and very pastoral person.

Fr. Stephen Te'e said that he always took Jesus (Eucharist) with him to the hospital. He thanked him for his willingness during the absence of Fr. Lawrence Kimaere OP and our bishop.

In reply, Fr. Charles said that he was repre-

senting his bishop from his diocese.

He thanked the Holy Spirit, which is always with him and sees the parish as many blessings from him. His dedication and contribution means a lot to him while fulfilling his mission.

During these 2 months of pastoral Fr. Charles earned a lot of experience traveling by sea and land in and around St. Peters parish Gizo; visiting the communities and giving out spiritual formation.

He visited the sick and the aging. He also gave talks on spiritual, moral and culture to training centers, youth groups, men's and women's groups and other spiritual groups.

Also, he had a big opportunity during his homily while celebrating Holy Eucharist. This was one of his privileges to approach the parishioners reminding them to be close to the church.

When interviewed, he mentioned that his pastoral visitation had motivated him to go further to those who are isolated. However, at the end of the

two months, he had offered enough and now he has to go back at his own diocese, Auki Malaita.

Some of his recommendations are;

- 1. When doing pastoral tours, a team should be encouraged for spiritual and moral programs.
- 2. If there is any weaknesses, see our priest for consultation.

Bishop Peter was warmly received by parish executives, diocesan workers, and the parishioners before the 10:00 am Mass celebration.

During Mass, the community in and around Gizo poured into the Cathedral to celebrate Mass with him, assisted by Vicar General Fr. Stephen Te'e and Fr. Dominic Soloko.

A beautiful, simple, powerful and encouraging message enlightened everyone from Bishop Peter's sermon on the 1st and 2nd readings and St Mathew's Gospel, on which he based his statement on 2 main questions; "Is there life after death? "and " Is there life after birth?"

Bishop Peter's presence here in our diocese was to facilitate the annual Priest Retreat in Bethania, Gizo from 26th to 30th June 2023.

However, his arrival motivated the Catholic community around Gizotownship to welcome him before his installment (2 months) as bishop of the Diocese of Gizo.

for the Diocese of Gizo whom has been welcomed at the Altar to serve the priests.

Rev, Jerome Kuibatu could assist parish priests or bishops, especially in missionary areas where a shortage of clergy existed. The diaconate should be restored as a permanent state of life, in accordance with the norms of the Dogmatic Constitution on the Church. It would help those men who carry out the ministry of a deacon - preaching the Word of God as catechists, governing scattered Christian communities in the name of the bishop or parish priest.

A historical event happening in the Catholic Church of Solomon Island, especially for the diocese of Gizo is the ordination of a married man to be close with the priests at the Altar. This has invited married men as well as singles to become Permanent Deacons (PDs) in the church.

He was ordained by Bishop Luciano Capelli sdb, assisted by his priests, and witnessed by his wife, children, relatives, and parishioners.

A beautiful celebration with the solemnity of St. Peter and Paul ended successfully with feasting and thanksgiving to God for the historical event.
